He's not a 'lording it over you' sort of leader but one who gets among His people and serves them. After washing His disciples' feet He said: "Very truly I tell you, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him." (John 13:16). lover. If we start with that picture, we see this in a very different light.

A human father wants his children to love him. A young man, wooing a certain girl, wants her to respond with love for him that matches the love he has for her.

The word 'worship' has at its root the idea of

drawing near to kiss. It is the heart of a loving response to someone. If you love someone, you draw near to kiss or embrace them, so you worship them.

God wants us to worship Him because He worships us! He is not an egotist looking for forced adulation, but a lover longing for the love He has to be both received and reciprocated!

Our Father, I dunno what this is all about, but....

For the Kingdom, the Power and the Glory are Yours, now and forever. Amen!

The prayer ends on a crescendo of praise.

Everything we have prayed about, we remind ourselves, is in the context of God having the power. His is the Kingdom, the one that will last forever and be there long after all the failed kingdoms of this world and the satanic realm are destroyed. God will answer us, but He gets the glory for it, not us. You might have laid your hands on the sick person who was healed...but that's all you did. God gets the glory!

In many ways we have come full circle. We started the prayer by reminding ourselves of who He is, where He is, and that everything is about Him. We end in much the same place. Whatever we have wrestled with in prayer...whatever tragedies we have been addressing, we leave prayer and go 'back into the world' knowing that God is in control and He is the Lord.

Amen is a declaration again, that we line ourselves up with all we have prayed and all that we have reminded ourselves about *God's perspective*. Let is be as He sees it, as He wills it. We're happy with

It's a good place to end this year. God's will being done. Let's pray that for the year to come too.
