about such things. Maybe instead you've talked to them about things like football, the Algerian siege, the girls you fancy, the latest film, the rising price of petrol, your kids.

There's nothing wrong with many of those things. But again, no-one gets saved through those conversations.

Romans 10:14 says how can they hear

He commissioned us to Go...make

without someone preaching to them? Jesus

preaching. At the end of Matthew's Gospel

made it clear whose job it was to do this

I've avoided giving opinions here about things like *Gay Marriage* and *Women Bishops*. The media is full of those things, it's supposed to be what Christians are talking about.

But, do you know, I don't

believe anyone anywhere has ever been saved because Christians have talked about things like that with non-believers. I don't think, when John Wesley rode round the country 300 years ago, he stopped in towns and spent the evening talking about the rights and wrongs of clergy wearing frocks (or whatever it was that was pulling the church apart in those days).

I'm not saying that we should not prayerfully discern God's mind on some of these things as a Church. But I am saying it's not the message we have for the world.

It's so easy to get side-tracked onto an agenda that either the media wants to run with (and end up making Christians look like fools or bigots) or that enables us to mark out ground for ourselves so that we look different to another group of Christians.

But then, maybe that's not you. Maybe you haven't spent time talking with unbelievers

*disciples.* The Bible describes Jesus as *The Word* (John chapter 1 and 1 John chapter 1). "At His voice creation, sprang at once to sight" (Caroline M Noel) and we are made in His image. In Revelation 1:15,16 we see Jesus with a sharp double edged sword coming out of HIs mouth, and His voice was like the sound of many waters. When Jesus speaks to people in the Gospels it is *always* to point people towards God, to receiving salvation.

As His people we are called to do the same.

Before we go any further, I am writing this as much to myself as to anyone else. It's so easy to 'live the quiet life' and join in with other peoples' conversations on their terms, rather than setting the agenda. It's far easier to get into a debate about "side issues" of religion – such as those mentioned earlier – and not to touch on the Gospel at all.




Let's try to talk about the Good News at least once in the coming week... and maybe post on the Facebook Group what happened when we did (positive or negative)
