## There are so many hard-to-believe bits in the Bible. Do I have to believe them?

I take it by this you mean the miracles, and some of the claims the Bible makes such as those to do with Creation, angels and demons and so forth.

The reason they are hard-to-believe for many of us is that they are not things we experience. Nor are they things we hear about in our secular lives. It's only when you open the Bible or go to church that you hear of a God who parted the Red Sea or walked on water.

But your question is intriguing too, because it sounds as though you feel it is a chore to *have to* believe. Can I not just be a Christian and cut out all the miracles and God-in-the-sky stuff?

But that is the God we come to. God is Spirit, He is not constrained by the physical universe as we are. And it is our spirit which first encounters Him, it is a spiritual understanding and relationship that He wants with us.

Our brains want logic, touch/feel/provable and seeable. In order to be able to approach God we need to deal with our brains and make them subject to our spirits. They need to be 'converted' into spiritual receptors and not just physical ones.

That doesn't mean you have to believe the whole shebang *before* you approach God. But you should be open to Him changing you.

God presents Himself to us as The Word, Jesus. He uses the medium of the written Word, the Bible, to do this. To say "I do not believe it" is to call Him a liar. Or to ultimately say you do not believe God, you do not believe in Him. So when it comes to the hard bits, the bits that don't fit into a 21st Century Western secular viewpoint, we need to be honest with Him and tell Him that but also to ask for His help to believe. Pray something like "Lord, I can't believe this at the moment. But I want to know You more, and I know that this is something You are telling me is the Truth. Though I find it hard to accept, I choose to believe it. Help me to come to a revelation of this as Truth, to that it affects my world view and brings me closer to You".

The Bible is Truth, my prayer is that each of us will get a deeper revelation of that Truth as we live our lives. That way we will not only be personally blessed, but we will sharpen each other and be able to bring God's Truth to the needy people around us.

Charles Lutwidge Dodgson lectured in mathematics at Oxford: hence the frequent references in the *Alice* books to measurement – see An Anthology. You may recall, too, that Douglas Adams (who died in 2001) wrote in *The Hitch Hiker's Guide to the Galaxy*: "The Answer to the Great Question of... Life, the Universe and Everything...[is] Forty-two."

Evidently, the product of  $6 \times 7$  possesses some compelling, mystical meaning. The Old Testament uses it continually. *Revelation xiii*, 5: 'and power was given unto him to continue forty and two months.' *Judges xii*, 6: 'Then they took him, and slew him at the passages of Jordan; and there fell at that time of the Ephraimites forty and two thousand.' *II Kings ii*, 24: 'And there came forth two she-bears out of the wood, and tare forty and two children of them.' *II Kings x*, 14: 'And they took them alive, and slew them at the pit of the shearing house, even two and forty men; neither left he any of them.'

Yet again, II Chronicles xxii, 2: 'Forty and two years old was Ahaziah when he began to reign...' And Matthew, like Luke, begins the story of Jesus (i, 2-16) with a genealogy tracing his family back to Abraham through 42 generations. Why forever 42?

qualifying age for the Roman Imperial rank of Consul...but this can become obsessive!

Three trifling instances, however: in Scotland, the home of curling, the traditional length of an 'end' (or a 'rink') was 42 yards and the weight of the stones 42 lb; and in the grocery trade it is common to sell cans, bottles, fruit, etc. in 42s (packing 6x7) – but that exposes the awkwardness of decimal pricing, so the goods are often offered at a price for 40 plus extra 2 free!

By the way, England possesses 42 Anglican cathedrals. And an Honorary Member, Christopher Martin-Jenkins, points out that the most important Law of Cricket, dealing with fair and unfair play, is Law No. 42.

Finally, to revert to Lewis Carroll, for his amazing story of the gravity train, in chapter 7 of *Sylvie and Bruno Concluded*.

Imagine a railway line running in a straight line from London to Edinburgh or, indeed, from any place on the Earth's surface to any other. Because the Earth's surface is curved, the line cuts into the Earth and so, to an observer at either end, appears to run downhill. But in fact only the first half of the route is downhill. So, if the train is released at one end and runs solely by the force of gravity, it will roll downhill, accelerating until it got half-way when it would start going uphill and consequently slow down. In the absence of resisting forces, it would come to rest at the other terminus. How long does the journey take? Remarkably, this duration is fixed, regardless of the distance between the termini or the weight of the train or the size of the Earth (just as the time of a pendulum's arc is fixed), because the only determinants are *gravity* and the Earth's *density*.

To make the problem mathematically amenable, we assume that the Earth is a uniform non-rotating solid sphere. (Of course, it's not uniform – the heavier bits tend to be in the middle – and it does rotate and it's not quite spherical, but these are marginal considerations.)

Now the equation for the journey time is: 4Gdt2 = 3pi where 'd' is the Earth's density, 'G' is the universal constant of gravitation and 't' is the required answer. This equation (like every equation in physics) is valid whatever coherent system of units is used. Here, 'coherent' means that if we are using the foot-pound-second system, then speed must be measured in feet per second rather than miles per hour. The value of 'G' is expressed by a formula (too complex to elaborate here) which, applied to the simple term of  $347^{1/4}$  lb/cu.ft to represent the Earth's density, yields a figure of 2,520 for 't'. So that's the journey time in seconds: just 42 minutes – always!

[Most authorities give the Earth's density as 344.4 lb/cu.ft, so the journey time would actually be a few seconds more than 42 minutes, but why spoil it!]

The question is: did Douglas Adams know all this?
